AFTER AN early departure, we made good time to the shuttle, arriving at Coqelles at 10.45am, with cloudless blue sky and warm sunshine – already 23 degrees. We arrived at Neuwied almost nine hours later, to be met by our hosts outside the Food Hotel where some of us were staying.

The next morning we started with a visit to Römerwelt, a Roman villa reconstructed on the original site, where we enjoyed cakes and wine from Roman recipes. Then it was off to the Drachenfels mountain to be taken to the summit by cog railway, visiting the ruined fortress overlooking the Rhine. Here we enjoyed Kaffe und Kuchen (coffee and cakes).

Then on to Rhöndorf, a Rhineside village I first visited 65 years ago – the home of Konrad Adenauer, the first Chancellor of the post-war West Germany. An expert guide took us around.

On Sunday, we visited the village of Leutesdorf for the Winzerfest, a celebration of the wine harvest. We enjoyed a wonderful procession and wine flowed like water, offered free to

those who retained their glasses from drinking at the stalls along the Rhine bank.

All had a shared bedroom, and the facilities included a gym, kitchen, laundry, social and benefits support, language classes and citizenship classes. It was a real challenge that was being met in a positive and practical way. All the rooms were made out of shipping containers.

We also visited the Neuwied Tennis Club as the annual match with Langley Park was under way, on a very hot day. It was good to meet with the Neuwied captain and thank him for his hospitality. I accompanied the BTTA to the Wine Festival at Leutesdorf, a very colourful and amazing event, with lots of music, dancing and of course wine!

The highlight of the weekend was the last evening dinner and entertainment with a local rock choir and the German hunting horn band, in which I the Mayor took part, much to the surprise of all attending.

I was also delighted to meet many of the BTTA members at the dinner. Regardless of Brexit or any challenges ahead, as BTTA and our Neuwied friends approach the 30th twinning birthday, we do so with confidence and a great continued partnership.
